We will re-open on **Tuesday 13 September 2016**

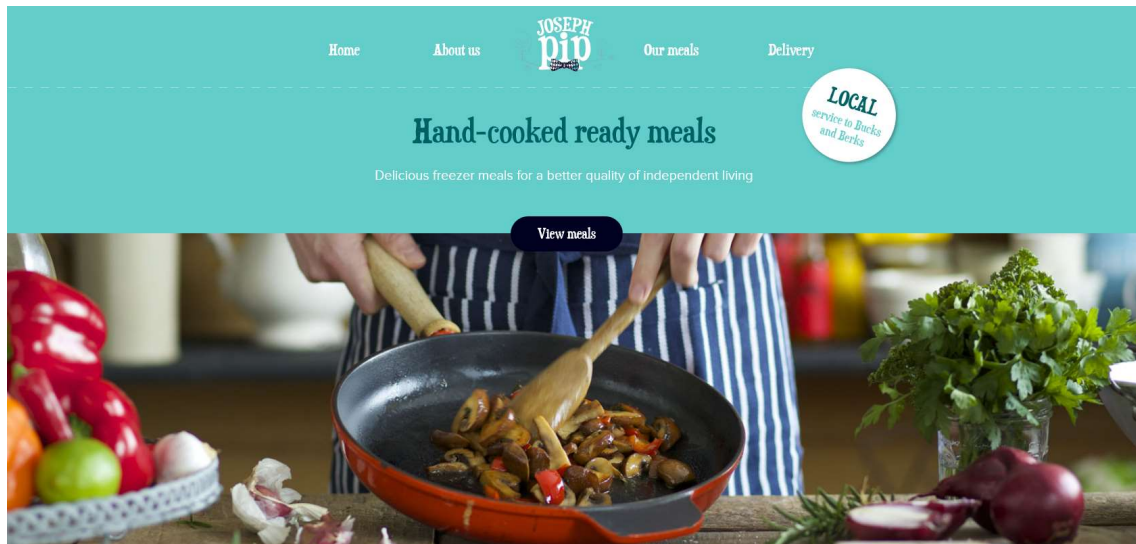

Judi Fisher, a volunteer from a charity called Workaid told us all about their activities using the motto 'Tools for Life'. Workaid will take donations of used tools and equipment that can be serviced and put back into good working order. These include:

Sewing machines - all makes & types, any age including vintage.
Haberdashery - everything for sewing, cotton fabric, leather, reels of thread, scissors pins, needles, lace, ribbon, zips, buttons
Bikes plus spare parts for bikes
Knitting machines - electric and manual if complete and with instructions
Wool - hand knitting wool., cones for knitting machines, knitting needles and patterns
Tools - carpentry, plumbing, motor mechanic, masonry, electricians, welding machines (MIG & arc)
Horticultural - spades, shovels, forks, shears, hand trowels, hoes

Profile of Audrey Thomas



I was born in Marylebone in 1929, when lamplighters still did the rounds at night, all that red on the atlas meant it was ours and children were seen and not heard.

Times have changed.

My mother had TB, incurable then, and I was farmed out to families around London until war came and we were evacuated to Tring, which was lovely.

During the blitz, we were in Shepherd's Bush. My school was bombed so we shared with another. People were great. If the roads were destroyed and there was no bus, they walked to work, and it was common to see heaps of rubble by the roadside topped by a blackboard saying "business as usual".

After the war I went to train as a nurse at Hillingdon Hospital and loved it, but left after two years because we were saving to get married and we bought a house in Slough. To help with the mortgage, I worked evenings at the telephone exchange, later changing to full-time as our children grew-up. I was put on a small team which covered Windsor Castle when the Royals were there. It was stressful but very interesting.

My husband loved walking and we were in the East Berks Ramblers. We also enjoyed walking and singing holidays, but his health deteriorated and eventually he was confined to a wheelchair. After we lost him, I continued to keep up the house and the garden but my children found me a flat in Maidenhead and despite my protests, the three of them moved me. It was the best thing I've ever done. The flats have a pretty garden, the deer come down from the golf course and we have a noisy woodpecker, but we forgive them.

The grandchildren currently are all living abroad but keep in touch by SKYPE which is incredible.

Times certainly have changed.

Yummy recipes from Dee:***Dorset Apple Cake***

1lb cooking apples
 8oz self-raising flour
 4oz caster sugar
 4oz butter
 Vanilla essence
 2 eggs
 2 tbsp milk

Topping

3oz caster sugar
 3oz butter
 4oz self-raising flour



Cream butter and sugar together, add eggs and vanilla essence, add flour and finally the milk to make a soft consistency; put into a lined 8" tin.

Slice the apples and layer on top of cake mixture.

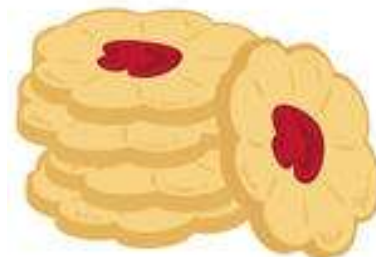
Make topping by mixing ingredients together and put on top of apples.

Bake for one and a half hours at 350f (gas no. 4)

Turn out cake, sprinkle with sugar and serve warm with cream.

Melting Moments

2½ oz self-raising flour
 1½ oz caster sugar
 2oz margarine
 Few drops of vanilla
 Rolled oats or desiccated coconut
 Cherries



Mix flour, sugar, margarine and vanilla together. Roll into balls, toss in oats or the coconut, flatten slightly, put cherry in middle. Arrange on greased baking tins and cook for 15 mins at 180.

'Thank you,' the blonde says, and hangs up.

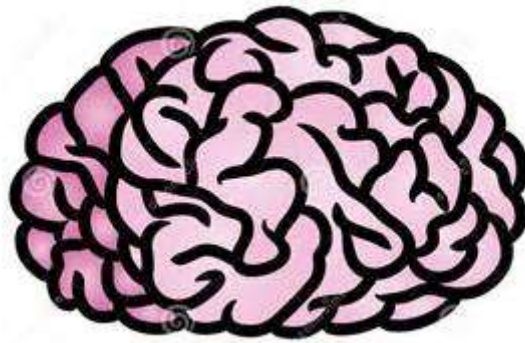

Brains of older people are slow because they know so much.
