Adding ticket sales on the day to ticket sales beforehand and the total raised was a magnificent £210.15 – thank you Sandy!









































Treasurer's report: David MacLeod

I joined Sequela as a trustee and treasurer in 2018 and it's my responsibility to look after the money and maintain proper financial records. As a registered charity, Sequela is regulated by the Charity Commission which requires that we submit an annual report. As our income is less than £25,000 pa, the report is very simple and has to state only our gross income, total expenditure and any income from Government grants.

Sequela's financial year runs from January to December and I thought you might be interested to see an update on the charity's finances.

INCOME: our income for 2022 has four main sources:

Member subscriptions (23 paid members)	£675
Donations from individuals or groups	£1,774 (incl £825 in
	memory of Murray)
Raffles	£424
Grants (community organisations or council)	£1,900 **

** £900 from Louis Baylis Trust £500 from Local Giving – 'Magic Little Grant' £500 from Berkshire Community Foundation

In addition, we have received income from Give as you Live and Amazon SMILE of £83. Remember, this is FREE money as I described it when I gave a presentation about how to sign up for these two schemes.

The £2 charged for the sandwich lunch is intended to cover the cost (£40); to date, we have paid out £840 and collected in a little more, £917, but that includes £60 in advance payments.

EXPENDITURE: our principal expenditure is of course the hire charge for NMCC Sports Bar which has been £100 per session since mid June. By the end of the year, we will have paid room hire charges totalling £3,340.


Other major expenditure categories are:

Payments to exercise professionals	£320
Public liability insurance	£220
Website hosting	£60
Printing of flyer	£149
Bank charges	£68

What the numbers don't show are the many 'little extras' contributed by our trustees/volunteers and the overpayments from many members. These are the actions that contribute to the great atmosphere at our meetings.

We will end the year with a healthy bank balance of approx. £11,400.
